This volume was a good read to me but probably not to anyone who isn't an ardent fan of Roman history, **Kindle Dio's romex** There are many interesting facts here and Dio packs a lot of information about a lot of people and events in a fairly short span, **Book Dio's rome2rio** Dio covers all the major events focusing most on the personal character of the Emperors, **EBook Dio's romelu lukaku** He clearly shows his reverence for his favorites--Vespasian Trajan Marcus Aurelius--and his disgust for those he loathes--Nero Domitian Commodus: **Dio's Rome booking** He is also a solid action writer and gives more life to battle scenes that other ancient writers I've read, **Dio's romeo elvis** A lot of this probably stems from the fact that this is a translation and also that sections of these books are missing but its true nevertheless: **Book Dio's romelu lukaku** The prose didn't have much flow and the chronology makes odd leaps, **Book Dio's romeo** Dio also doesn't seem to import much style either just bland straightforwardness. **Book Dio's romeo** While this works for a non-fiction book it just doesn't have the same flavor as Suetonius's gossipy tone or Eusebius's Godly reverence. However this isn't an easy read
