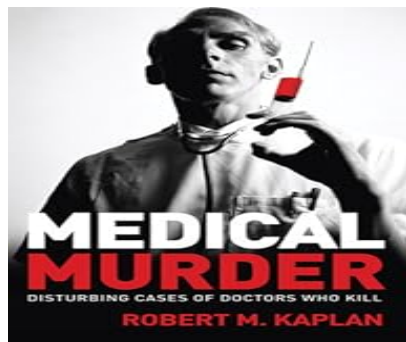


Medical Murder: Disturbing Cases of Doctors Who Kill By Robert M. Kaplan **Medical murders**

The sobering thing about many of the cases looked at in this book is how untouchable a doctor can often be - the lack of scrutiny even an unwillingness to believe that a doctor could possibly be totally out of control was extremely disturbing. **Medical murderfolk** Many of the doctors discussed were abject serial killers; some were political figures; and some (namely Kevorkian and Nitschke) were not obviously murderers at all - although they did help people die. **Medical murder podcast**  
Overall an enjoyable read! Psychiatry I have a few quibbles with this book an otherwise and interesting and horrifying expose on a profession usually thought to contain few real criminals. **Medical murders podcast hosts** In the chapter Killing with Kindness Kaplan fails to distinguish real voluntary euthanasia from the act of nudging a comatose patient over the edge - widely believed to have been the way King George V ended his life. **Medical murders podcast** (According to A King's Story the biography of Edward VIII later the Duke of Windsor this was done so his death could be announced in the quality newspapers rather than tabloids). **Medical murder podcast**  
While Kevorkian in particular may have been a colourful and controversial character the subsequent gradual acceptance of the right of seriously ill people to consider voluntarily ending their lives shows even Kevorkian and certainly Nitschke to have had some compassion for intolerable suffering. **Medical murderface metalocalypse** For the rest the book charts the careers of the weird and enigmatic Dr Shipman who may have murdered more than 218 elderly patients; the deluded and megalomaniacal Harry Bailey who wilfully pursued a discredited deep sleep treatment for mental disorders resulting in at least 20 deaths and the horrific career of Radovan Karadzic psychiatrist of the Bosnian genocide - an exponent of the old cliché about psychiatrists being as mad as the people they treat. **Medical murder podcast** Many of the doctors mentioned in the book suffered from grandiosity believing their knowledge and position justified the exercise of power - the power of life and death - over their patients. **Medical murderbot diaries** The style is very dry and factual; the only times I felt a sense of energy reading was when the discussion about doctors who kill turned to cases I already had some background information on such as Dr. **Medical murderball**  
**documentary** The rest of the cases got very confused in my mind because Kaplan seems to make the erroneous assumption that his readers come pre-familiar with the doctors he chooses to examine
